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INTRODUCTION

What does this document do?

This Action Plan has been developed by the relevant authorities (see below) for the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau candidate Special Area of Conservation (cSAC), following a public consultation on the draft management plan that took place in Autumn 2000. That draft plan was developed through a process of consultation between the relevant authorities and a wide range of users of the site and representatives of interest groups, businesses and local communities, including through a series of meetings of a specially constituted Liaison Group.

This Action Plan sets out the things that the relevant authorities and others will be doing for the purpose of managing the area in accordance with the requirements of the legislation concerning SAC's, namely the EC Habitats and Species Directive of 1992, and the Conservation (Natural Habitats, &c.) Regulations 1994. As a *candidate* SAC, the provisions of this legislation do not apply to Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau, but it is Government (and relevant authority) policy that it should be treated as if designated. See section 2 for some further background to the cSAC.

The boundary of the site is shown in the Maps at the end of this section. Early in 2001 the boundary of the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC and the list of habitat types and species for which it is selected were revised as part of the "moderation" of the UK SAC series. However, all the preparatory work for the preparation of this Action Plan took place before this review took place, and therefore this Action Plan is based on the earlier boundary and citation. This plan is to be kept under review (see section 7) and this will include taking account of the additional site features and the revised site boundary.

Relevant authorities for the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC

All public or statutory bodies – termed "competent authorities" – have responsibilities towards the management of cSACs. Each competent authority with functions relevant to marine conservation is required to exercise those functions to comply with the requirements of the Habitats Directive. Some of these competent authorities are also "relevant authorities", and have additional powers to establish management schemes for marine sites. The following bodies are the relevant authorities for the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC which have prepared a management scheme for the site, including this action plan:

Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau has been one of 12 pilot marine SACs in the "UK Marine SACs Project", a 4½ year project financially supported by the European Commission's LIFE-Nature Programme. As well as supporting the development of the management scheme for this cSAC, the project has also produced a number of other publications dealing with a range of subjects of key relevance to the management of marine SACs. Most are or will soon be available on the English Nature website (<u>http://www.english-nature.org.uk/uk-marine</u>). Those of particular applicability to the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC include:

- Guidelines for managing water quality impacts within UK European marine sites (441pp)
- Investigating and managing water quality in saline lagoons (134pp)
- Guidelines for managing the collection of bait and other shoreline animals within UK European marine sites (132pp)
- A review of the effects of fishing within UK European marine sites (134pp)
- Good practice guidelines for ports and harbours operating within or near UK European marine sites (120pp, plus appendices)
- A review of the effects of recreational interactions within UK European marine sites (264pp)
- Guidelines for managing and monitoring aggregate extraction within UK European marine sites (in prep)

There is also a series of reports on the dynamics and sensitivities of a range of marine features, some of which occur within this cSAC.

How to use this document

Following the Action plan summary (section 2), sections 3 to 7 list over 100 separate actions, identified in the management plan for the cSAC, to be undertaken by a range of different organisations.


The actions are organised under the following headings:

- Section 3 Actions relating to all relevant human activities affecting the area, organised by type of activity (for example, construction works, fisheries, marine recreation, and so on)
- Section 4 Actions relating to "Plans and projects": Plans and projects are certain types of operation that, under the legislation, are subject to specific regulatory procedures. Many relate to sectors of activity covered in section 1, and cross-references are made where appropriate.
- Section 5 Actions relating to "natural processes": These are factors that are not directly associated with any particular human activities
- Section 6 Actions relating to interpretation and education: there are many actions relating to the cSAC generally, or to specific sectors of interest, which are to do with the promotion of the cSAC and raising awareness about the conservation issues. It has been decided to group these together.
- Section 7 Actions relating to the process of developing the plan, maintaining it and keeping it under review.

Finally, in order to make it easier to identify all the actions associated with a particular organisation, Section 8 lists all the action numbers against each organisation.

Each of sections 3 to 7 consists of a table identifying the action, organisation(s) responsible, specific targets associated with each action and, where possible, the timescale within which each target is intended to be met.

Each of the tables in sections 3 to 7 are presented in the following format (hypothetical examples):



Site location, boundary and features for which the site is selected

The Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC is located off northwest and west Gwynedd and north Ceredigion. It extends from Penrhyn Nefyn on the north Llŷn coast to the mouth of the Afon Clarach north of Aberystwyth.

Boundary of the cSAC on which this Action Plan is based

As explained on page 1-i, this Action Plan is based on the boundary and citation for the site prior to revisions made as part of the "moderation" of the UK SAC series. This original boundary is shown on Map 1 The site was originally selected for its **reefs** and **estuaries** and their associated wildlife, and currently the Action Plan relates only to these features.

The original boundary of the cSAC was determined to encompass the reef and estuary features with the seaward boundary drawn to encompass the underwater reefs around Pen Llŷn and the Sarnau in the northeast part of Cardigan Bay. In the Dwyryd, Mawddach and Dyfi estuaries the boundary extended up to the limit of tidal influence as defined on the Ordnance Survey 1:50,000 scale map. In the Dyfi estuary, the boundary followed mean high water mark. In the Mawddach and Dwyryd estuaries only the low water channels of the estuaries were included, even though the site had been selected on the basis of the whole estuaries. This was due to a stipulation by Government that intertidal areas have to be notified as Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) before they can be included within the boundary of an SAC. The rest of the landward boundary followed mean low water mark ordinary tides for most of the cSAC, except at Porth Dinllaen SSSI where it extended to mean high water mark. This, again, was due to the government requirement with respect to SSSI explained above. The draft management plan (Chapter 2) notes that intertidal areas may be considered for inclusion within the cSAC and that there would be consultation about any such proposals.

Revisions to the boundary and addition of new features

During the preparation of the draft management plan and, subsequently, this Action Plan, there was a review of the UK's SAC series (requested by the European Commission)¹. As part of this so-called "moderation" exercise it was proposed that the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau cSAC should include a further 6 marine habitats and 3 marine/estuarine species and that there should be changes to the boundary of the cSAC both to encompass these features as well as extend the SAC to include parts of the intertidal where new survey information showed that these areas qualified for notification as SSSI.

There was a consultation about these changes during the latter part of 2000 and these revisions have subsequently been submitted to the European Commission and now form part of the Pen Llŷn a'r Sarnau candidate SAC.

¹ In 1999, the lists of candidate SACs from each EU member state within the Atlantic biogeographical region, including the UK, were reviewed at meetings convened by the EC. Following this review, the UK along with a number of other member states was asked by the European Commission to submit further sites, and to identify additional features of interest on existing sites.

The original boundary and the subsequent revisions following moderation are shown on Maps 2/1 to 2/7.

In addition to the reefs and estuaries, the following habitats and species are also now features of the cSAC:

Habitats:	Subtidal sandbanks Mudflats and sandflats Large shallow inlets and bays Submerged or partially submerged sea caves Coastal lagoons Atlantic saltmeadows
Species:	Bottlenose dolphin Grey seal Otter

The Action Plan will in due course require revision to accommodate these additional features and the revised site boundary (see section 7).
